Terri was at the tubing hill at the annual tubing party for children with difficult and challenging living situations when she was struck by a brain aneurysm. Due to the effective CPR (all the way to the hospital in the squad as well) of PNS patrollers she did survive over 24 hours which allowed her out of state family to arrive, and her passing resulted in the gift of life for several people through organ donation.

On February 3-5, the Ohio Region hosted the first ever Ohio Region Women's Clinic. The first day, many participants and Instructors team enjoyed spending the day with D-Team Women's Ambassador, Heidi Ettlinger. The entire clinic was created to provide an opportunity for women patrollers to meet and support each other, and, in the words of one of the attendees, a place "to let our hair down and be ourselves." A chance to get away and meet other women in a clinic of our own, grows from the current status of women in the patrolling community. Many women in the Ohio Region discover that they are sometimes the only female on their duty shift, and when they show up for an SES or TES they will likely find that all, or most, of their trainers are men, as are most of the other participants. As for leadership positions, women in this roll are still in the minority.

The women's program and clinic are not aimed at replacing existing training activities which have been so valuable to all women in the region. (We have a fantastic Snowsports School and Transportation program in the Ohio Region!) Rather, its purpose is to create an engaging environment where women can gain support from each other, admit their vulnerability, and have a few laughs. Participants in this clinic left the weekend gathering with a renewed spirit and ready to share their enthusiasm for patrolling with the rest of the region.

The Ohio Region Women's Program is about leadership development and sisterhood. It's truly about making us better patrollers. Mountain Travel and Rescue

The Mountain Travel and Rescue courses are electives for the Senior Program. These events are a good way to learn wilderness survival skills and enhance your knowledge of outdoor travel and rescue. Cat Hufnagle is the new Ohio Region Mountain and Travel Advisor and encourages you to attend this program. Ohio Region has a great group of instructors that make this an outstanding program. National Ski Patrol made significant changes to the Mountain Travel and Rescue Program (MTR) and instructor training requirements in November 2016. These changes included defined terrain guidelines, FEMA course requirements for MTR I and II and skills check off list for MTR II.

The major changes are the FEMA course requirements for MTR Fundamentals and MTR 1 require completion of the IS 100, 700. MTR 2 requires IS 200. These are free online classes in the Incident Command System with FEMA.

The MTR information on the Ohio Region website will be updated with the new requirements and details course descriptions. Lastly, NSP has outlined five course programs. There are the Fundamentals Class, MTR I and II, Clinics and Enhancement Seminars. The Clinics and Enhancement Seminars must be at least 6 hours in length to allow for more focused areas of training.

MTR 1 class was completed on March 24-26, 2017 at Ewing Woods near Mansfield Ohio. The classroom, field and camping sessions were all combined into one weekend-long course. MTR 2 is scheduled for November 10-12 at Lake Hope. The prerequisites for MTR 2 class are completion of MTR 1 and the FEMA courses IS 100,700 and 200.

MTR 1 course offers hands on practice and basic techniques in wilderness navigation, mountain travel, and survival, including emergency shelters, the Incident Command System, group dynamics, and SAR.

MTR 2 course offers at least two days and night field session of in-depth practice in land navigation, search and rescue, rescue rigging, survival skills and emergency shelters. To pass MTR 2, students must demonstrate independent proficiency in a well-defined set of backcountry travel, land navigation and emergency shelter.



Spring 2017 Certified Program

Congratulations to Andrew French! Andrew qualified for the Certified Program this season at our Qualification Clinic at PNS in January and went on to pass an impressive number of modules at this year's Certified Test in Marquette, MI. He will join Tracy Buchanan and Mark Branham as they all work towards Certified next season. Ron Gerdes from PNS has stepped up to the plate and will serve as the next Central Division Certified Program Supervisor. The Region is proud to have one of our very own lead one of the most exciting programs within our Division.

Next year's annual test will be at Lutsen Mountain. This is an excellent opportunity for all interested patrollers to see what the Certified Program is all about. Any patroller wishing to enter the program must qualify at our annual Qualification Clinic held in early January at Perfect North. Please contact me if you would like more information about the Certified Program.

Despite the less than ideal weather, we had a great season at Perfect North Slopes. We had a wonderful class of 11 candidates join us in August for our 16 week training course, which culminated in a 100% pass rate for both the written and practical tests. The short season (71 days and 12,351.51 hours worked by our patrollers) prevented some from finishing their board/ski and toboggan certifications, but those that finished crushed it and the remainder are well on their way. Our patrollers were active on a local, regional and national level, helping in traditional and non-traditional venues.

The 2016/2017 ski season at Paoli Peaks began with high hopes as cold temperatures in early December allowed the resort to begin operations on December 16th. Unfortunately warmer weather throughout the winter hampered operations throughout the season. Paoli Peaks closed for the season on February 20th after being open 52 1/2 days. Our Tuesday night team was particularly hard hit as the resort was open only 3 Tuesday evenings during the season.

The Paoli Peaks Ski Patrol roster dropped by 12 patrollers this season leaving us with 67 registered patrollers. Of those only 60 were active this season. Despite the short season our patrollers averaged 48 hours each to log a total of 2855 hours.

We have been working on revamping our OEC training to utilize online resources to minimize the number of hands on hours required and to make that time more productive. The team will be meeting with the OEC instructors in late May to begin rolling out the new format. We have high hopes that this format will help the Patrol to recruit and strong candidate class for the 2017/2018 season.
