## **Ohio Region Alumni**

This is my first article as Ohio Region Alumni Advisor, but many will recognize me from my previous role as Region Director for the Ohio Region. Since completing my term in that office I have been a registered alumni with the NSP and am still actively involved as Alumni Emeritus at BM/BW/AV where I continue to ski with the duty shifts that I used to when I was actively patrolling and assist at other off-season events such as the annual ski swap. Enough about me for now. Let's see what's happening with Alumni around the region.

When I first stepped into this role, Richard Schieltz, previous Alumni Advisor, provided a wealth of information and files that helped me get off to a fast start. I was surprised to see that there are 235 individuals listed in the Alumni roster of which 131 are listed as active meaning that they are registered with National and current through 12/31/2017. 104 are listed as inactive meaning they did not register with National in 2017. However, some may still be active with their local alumni chapters. I recently contacted them and asked if they would reconsider registering with National again and asked them to provide the name of the patrol with which they were associated. Some have already replied that they would register again.

Alumni groups are active at Perfect North Slopes, BM/BW/AV, Mad River Mountain, and Snow Trails / Clear Fork. Other alumni in the Region coordinate their activities through their local patrol directors. Alumni continue to ski and assist at patrol events such as OEC Refreshers, Ski Swaps, on-hill events and recruiting. Some perform administrative duties as requested by the local patrol directors. Participating in social activities, such as Retro Rusty day at Mad River Mountain and Over-The-Hill gang luncheons for BM/BW/AV Alumni, provide an excellent way for alumni to socialize, stay connected with each other and keep up to date with their local patrols.

The Alumni program provides an excellent bridge between active patrolling and full retirement from the ski patrol. If you are an instructor in an NSP program you may be able to continue in that role as an Alumni. Contact your local patrol director to learn more.

My role as Region Advisor is to promote the program, increase the membership in the Ohio Region and assist local patrols and alumni groups.

According to the NSP's "Guide to Mentoring New Instructors," mentoring is a process with a broader reach than skill development (coaching) by including a continued emphasis on problem solving and reasoning.

Paying attention to the instructor trainee's concerns and needs is crucial.

Every patrol in the Ohio Region offers a unique mentoring opportunity with different guidelines. Ultimately, the ID mentor role remains consistent...an experienced NSP instructor that willingly desires to become a trusted advisor and provide guidance to an instructor trainee in the same discipline. ## Mountain Travel and Rescue

The Mountain Travel and Rescue II (MTRII) class was held on November 10-12, 2017 at Lake Hope State Park on the Zalewski State Forest Hiking Trail. There were 12 people who attended the event, six students, four instructors, and two non ski patrollers. We were able to camp at the Lake Hope School house trailhead Friday night. Weather went to a low of 15 degrees Friday into Saturday morning. We hiked into the group campsite set up camp. Except for the temperature it was a nice weekend with no rain nor wind and a bit of sunshine.

Special thank you to Greg Schmidt (PNS), Chris Korte (PNS), and Tim Durbin (STSP) for teaching the class. Chris Korte was certified as an Instructor Trainer (IT). In March we should have Tim Durbin added as an IT also. We certainly used our cold weather training and gear that weekend. The next Mountain Travel and Rescue I (MTRI) is being planned for March 2018 with the date and location to be announced.

New changes to our program are the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) course requirement: IS 100, 700 for MTRI and IS 200 for MTRII. These are free online classes in the Incident Command System with FEMA. Lastly, NSP has outlined five course programs. There are the Fundamentals Class, MTR I and II, Clinics and Enhancement Seminars. The Clinics and Enhancement Seminars must be at least 6 hours in length to allow for more focused areas of training.

The MTR I course offers hands on practice and basic techniques in wilderness navigation, mountain travel, and survival, including emergency shelters, the Incident Command System, group dynamics, and Suspicious Activity Reporting (SAR).

MTR 2 course offers at least a two days and night field session of in-depth practice in land navigation, search and rescue, rescue rigging, survival skills and emergency shelters. To pass MTR II, students must demonstrate independent proficiency in a well defined set of backcountry travel, land navigation and emergency shelter.

## WINTER 2018 AT PERFECT NORTH SLOPES

Perfect North opened December 9, 2017 for the season and we as patrollers, are keeping both fingers and toes crossed for good long season. We are the beneficiaries of a redesigned Aid Room this year. Each bed now has the full range of equipment (except bubble wrap) right next to it. We also had two (2) television screens installed – the first one overlooks the aid room beds and is currently used to broadcast safety messages and general information about the hill. It will also be set up to allow us to provide entertainment to our guests in order to distract them from their various injuries. The second screen will allow the names of the patrollers on duty to be listed and eventually will show the location of the patrollers around the hill, enabling us to more efficiently deploy our patrollers.

For the second time, Dr. Jim Phero and the staff at the University of Cincinnati Medical School Simulation Center hosted a series specifically designed for patrollers, confronting us with various medical emergencies. The Sim Center's equipment showed us how to maximize the efficiency of CPR and bag-valve techniques.

We are also adopting a Mountain Host Program under the auspices of the National Ski Patrol. Although we are still working on the details, our intent is that it serve as a feeder program for the Patrol and not the other way around. We believe that with the reduced level of training required, this group will be a wonderful supplement to our Patrol family.

We had our first (and hopefully last) chair evacuation of the season on a recent Saturday night. Management has adopted the practice of training staff and instructors in chair evacuation procedures so we had plenty of capable help and the evacuation went smoothly, despite the bitter cold weather. The affected guests received a free lift pass for a future visit as well as food credits and they seemed appreciative.

Please remember that the Senior test is at PNS on Feb 24. If Senior candidates would like to practice on our hill beforehand, please let Mike Reed (Reedmg@gmail.com) know and he will do his best to accommodate.
