# Message from Chris Raudabaugh:

Safe Sports Act

The Protecting Young Victims from Sexual Abuse and Safe Sport Authorization Act of 2017 was created in reaction to the abuse found various youth sports organizations, including USA Gymnastics. This act will create a new standard of care that will affect youth-serving organizations across the country. The purpose of the law is to expand existing mandated reporting laws to all youth sport organizations that participate in international or interstate sporting events.

The question that I have received is how this impacts us as patrollers? The foremost responsibility that could fall on a patroller is reporting any abuse. Mandatory reporting can vary from state to state. In general, some of us are in professions where there is a mandatory requirement to report abuse in any circumstances. For those patrollers, they know their own responsibilities. For all others, it depends on state laws in general. Indiana, it mandates everyone to report abuse issues. In Ohio, only certain professions. I've shared these states laws with your leadership if interested.

Regardless of the varying laws, your leadership should work with your local management to determine the procedure for reporting abuse. Follow those requirements for your own area.

### AWARDS

The snow is flying and have started skiing for the 2020 season. That means it's time to start preparing those award applications. As we all know it takes a lot of time to gather 4 years worth of historical

information, so it's so much better to keep these as living documents, especially the Patrol of the Year. Add this year's information to the previous write up and drop off the oldest information. Remember anyone who won at region / division last year is not eligible this year, and anyone who won national is not eligible for 4 years.

Look around your region:

Did any patrollers treat a significant injury that was not immediately life threatening but could be over time? Submit them for a Central Division Critical Care Award. Who has provided exceptional service to the Region, Division and/or the NSP as an administrator, patrol director/representative, Instructor or OEC Instructor over the last three years? Start gathering information to submit them as an "Outstanding XXXX" for Region judging.

We all know that our region's patrols provide outstanding service to the region, division, and the National Ski Patrol as well. Start gathering information to submit them as an "Outstanding XXXX Patrol" for Region judging. And remember – Nordic patrol is never submitted from this region – not only should they be recognized but may have a good chance at division as well!

All the same rules apply – deadline for submissions to me is February 14 th. We must use the current forms, which I will forward to the local advisors and have on the web site as well under Awards Program.

NO repeat, NO PDFs. Forms must be submitted as Word. Font no smaller than 9, Times New Roman. No information can be from before the 2016-2017 season. Nominations cannot be longer than 4 pages. There is no longer a letter, just the last question, "why is this patroller outstanding?" This should not be signed. Remember also that someone who holds a region position, with the exception of an IT, is not eligible for Outstanding Patroller, and the Outstanding Administrative Patroller must hold a region position or beyond. So get busy gathering your data, February 14 th is closer than you think! Mark your calendar for the

News to Note

•

The 6<sup>th</sup> edition is in process, with a determination to complete it this spring. Watch carefully for news about its release, as well as IT and Instructor updates that will be provided prior to refreshers and new candidate classes for 2020.

- Pelvic injury protocol description in the recent Patrol magazine: Some might think that, because the article advocated for the use of the BEAN lift instead of the log role when managing this injury, the current <u>Standard of Training remains unchanged at this time</u>. The use of the log roll is what we have in the OEC 5<sup>th</sup>, and this is what our SoT is. While the protocol might change and as you know it can until there is an official announcement provided to us through either a new textbook or via our National Program and Division leaders, we stick to the 5<sup>th</sup>!
- In 2020 we will hold a series of Instructor Trainer review sessions. Anyone who wishes to remain an IT after December 31, 2020 must attend on these events. Please watch for times and dates – probably after ski season ends and running through next fall – so that you don't miss them.
- We are having some challenges with instructors having their status "dropping off" their NSP profile. Please check your status and, if you have "dropped" please contact me immediately, at <u>alidamoonen@gmail.com</u>. I am working with our Division OEC Supervisors, Kim and RaeAnn, to get this sorted out.

### **Senior Program**

#### Change of Focus for the OEC Module of the Senior Program



At the Spring Division Meeting in Chicago the assembled OEC Region Administrators and Senior Test Coordinators made the decision to change the focus of the OEC Module of the Senior Program (OECMSP) from a test focus to one emphasizing continuing education and skills improvement. The goal is to encourage patrollers to become involved in the training program regardless of whether or not they chose to do the final evaluation. Past candidates for the OECMSP have noted, whether they were successful at the test or not, that their confidence in their skills and their ability to manage an accident scene were much improved. Since skills tend to deteriorate if they are not used, and since the OECMSP has an OEC skill component along with scene management and leadership components, participation could provide any patroller the opportunity to gain skills and confidence as a result of the training without having to go through the test if they prefer not to.

This fall, there were 3 Trainer Evaluator (TE) clinics in which our region TEs learned about the Division's change of focus as well as participating in Senior level scenarios as both lead patroller on the scene and evaluators. These clinics help the TEs prepare for both the candidate training programs held at each of the areas and the final evaluation for trainees choosing to take the test.

For those choosing to take the test, the 2020 test weekend – January 11-12 – is to be held at Mad River Mountain. At the time of this writing there are about 14 candidates for the OECMSP and a number of them also intend to participate in the Aid Room Module. We wish all the candidates the best of luck at the test, and want to say a big Thank You to the numerous region TEs and patrollers who have agreed to participate as patients, trained help, and any of the other positions needed to make the test day a success.

## Greetings from the Paoli Peaks Ski Patrol!

After months of preparation it's time to Ski! Paoli Peaks Ski Patrol is prepared for a truly EPIC 2019-2020 ski season. Snowmaking at Paoli Peaks Ski Resort commenced on Dec 10 and opened Dec 20, but had to be closed during the holidays due to unseasonably warm weather.

Paoli Peaks Ski Patrol did not hold an OEC course this year. Unfortunately, we had several candidates drop just as the course was set to begin leaving us with a class of 4 candidates. These candidates have been accepted into the Paoli Peaks Ski Patrol and we are committed to working with them through the season with the promise that we will hold an OEC course next year.

Many of you may be unaware that Paoli Peaks is an "upside down" ski resort. At Paoli Peaks the parking area and lodge are at the top of the hill. This arrangement requires that the Ski Patrol transport patients uphill rather than downhill as is more common. This has always been accomplished using snowmobiles to tow the loaded toboggans uphill. Resort management is looking at ways to limit or eliminate the use of snowmobiles on the hill during operating hours. At this time it appears we will begin transporting patients downhill using toboggans in the traditional manner and then transfer to a vehicle for transport uphill. This should make for an interesting ski season as we continue to investigate and improve the process for evacuating injured customers from the resort. Peaks resorts was purchased by Vail and we are in the process of transitioning to a Vail Resort.
